**Thursday, April 19th, 7pm General Meeting Program:** Misty Radue on Equine Conditioning. Misty is the owner of Bar R Performance Horses and is a well-known equine trainer and breeder who volunteers as a 4H leader. She is a member of the Board of Directors for the GC Fairgrounds. Misty is a native Montanan who teaches and trains horses for Barrel Racing, Western Pleasure, Western Halter and Reining. *The rules are:* be ready to leave the trail head at 10am prompt. You must call the trail boss in advance if you plan to ride. Members, your family, and your guests are welcome.

*Rules applying on the trail:* riders stay together, do not pass, keep same speed as leader, keep safe distance from horse in front of you, do not ride off when someone has not mounted, gates are kept closed as you found them, and do not turn back to trailhead **alone** if that is necessary, Dogs and Stallions do not belong on our rides – BCH rule. Take your slicker, warmer clothes just in case, hat, lunch, water, personal first aid and maybe your camera.

### **Presidents Report April 2007**

I want to thank Janice Cartwright for stepping up to the plate and agreeing to take on the Chairmanship of the Horse Safety Clinic coming up on April 21<sup>st</sup> at the Gallatin County Fairgrounds. Janice was in charge of the event last year and did an exceptional job, and I believe she will do an excellent job this time around also. I'm reminded of the old adage "If you need something done ask a busy person, nobody else has time!". Janice definitely fits this description as evidenced by all of the horsemanship training that she has been doing at the Fair Grounds which she has invited the club members to attend.

You may have seen in the paper re-

cently that the Forest Service is going to stay with the current travel plan and has rejected all of the appeals. We decided to drop the appeal on March 16<sup>th</sup> after assurances from Becki Heath that we would be able to work with the Ranger to improve the trails so they could be used by stock without resource damage. We have met a number of times with the Forest Supervisor Becki Heath and have received a letter from Becki stating that the seasonal closures are at the discretion of the Ranger in the district and we are encouraged to work with the Ranger to get the seasonally closed trails improved so they no longer require early closure. We were also assured we could use the closed trails with stock in case of an emergency. Overall the stock users made out pretty

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well in the travel plan compared to the motorized groups. We didn't get everything we wanted, but we know that our concerns were listened to and a number of closures were avoided.

The convention will be over by the time you read this article and I hope we can find two other people to attend the convention as delegates. We have six people that have agreed to go so far which is twice as many as we had attend last year. Conventions are a great way to find out what the other chapters are doing and meet with other people that enjoy horse related activities. We will have a new display to show off what the club has been doing over the year. We will discuss seven resolutions which is always a lively discussion with lots of opinions expressed. The presentations are always top notch and the entertainment always enjoyable. If you haven't been to a convention I strongly urge you to attend one. The conventions are held in a rotating manner with new organizations able to host a convention if they chose. Our turn is coming up soon, so you may be attending a convention in your own back yard very soon.

I will be attending Sabrina's clinic she has graciously offered to provide to the club as a fund raiser. Sabrina normally gets \$165 per person at her clinics and they have been well attended. She agreed to lower the price to \$35 so it would be more affordable for our club members. We have a lot of talent and expertise in our club and I am glad people are willing to spread their talents around to the rest of us.

Bob Steinman has graciously accepted the chairmanship of the Poker Ride and has recruited a few of our new members as Co-Chairs to help him with the job. We will be

handing out lists at the following meetings asking for help on the different jobs. We also need you to start contacting anyone you know that is willing to donate prizes for the ride. This is our major fund raiser of the year and something that we have got a lot of positive comments about over the years. If you are interested in helping with any of the duties or have something to donate please get a hold of Bob and let him know.

Trail riding season will be here soon and because of the limited trail maintenance budget the Forest Service is going to rely on us to help them clear the trails. If you have some spare time and would like to help out on some of these trail clearing activities please contact Chick Hale for more information. Brian McNeil gave us a presentation in February and proposed a new contract based agreement instead of the volunteer program we had been operating under. The District Ranger Jose Castro has decided that he would prefer that we stay with the volunteer program for now. We may still do some separate contract work if we wish, but the main trail clearing will be done under the existing volunteer program. This means we will need to get some people trained in Cross Cut, Chainsaw, Bear Spray, Horse Safety, and First Aid so we have someone qualified on the trail crews.

If you have any ideas to make our club better please give me a call or send me an email. Remember our contest for getting the most new members to join which started on January 1<sup>st</sup>. Rich Winget is on a roll so you will have to get busy to catch up!

Beginning in 2007 all individuals bringing equine stock into YNP will be required to possess proof of a negative Coggins test for each animal. The test must be performed within the past 12 months. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

## Breeding your mare

To a young foal everything is new, and how you handle him, feed him, and care for him will lay the foundation for the rest of his life.

The first step in raising a healthy foal is a healthy mare. Prior to breeding, your mare should be in good weight, current on all vaccinations and de-wormed. The ideal diet incorporates good quality hay with 12-14% protein and a proper ratio of calcium and phosphorus with adequate amounts of trace minerals.

For mares at risk of early pregnancy loss you may want to monitor blood progesterone levels during the first trimester.

An important safeguard during pregnancy is vaccinating against equine herpes virus (Pneumobort K) on the fifth, seventh, and ninth month of pregnancy. Equine Herpes virus is the leading cause of infectious viral abortions in mares.

You should booster your mare four to six weeks prior to foaling with Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, Influenza, Rhino, and West Nile Virus. These vaccinations stimulate the mare to produce high levels of protective antibodies at a time during late pregnancy when she is also producing antibody rich colostrum. The newborn relies on ingestion of colostrum and absorption of these antibodies during the first 12-24 hours of life for protection against a wide variety of viral and bacterial diseases.

The average gestation length for most mares is 335-340 days. Some signs of impending delivery are gradual udder development two to five weeks prior to delivery. Most mares will "wax" within hours to a few days prior to foaling. Udder secretions form on the end of the teats and appear as a wax substance. When the placenta ruptures and the mare ex-



pels a large volume of fetal fluids delivery should progress rapidly with the foal being born within 30-45 minutes. The foal should be presented with both forelimbs extended followed by the nose and the rest of the head.

The mare should pass the placenta within 3 hours of delivery. It is important that the mare pass the placenta to prevent uterine infection and or laminitis. The placenta should weigh about 10% of the foal's birth weight.

A healthy foal should be able to stand within one hour of delivery and should be nursing within two hours. It is important to dip the umbilical stump in dilute nolvasan or betadine for 2-3 days. The foal should pass the first fecal material (me conium) within 12-20 hours after birth; it is usually pelleted and dark brown or black in color. A prophylactic enema given at birth will help prevent impaction from the me conium. Foals will usually nurse 4-8 times per hour. When your foal is born, he inherits immediate disease protection through his mother's colostrums, but eventually their natural antibodies decline and your foal will need protection from vaccination himself.

Young foals are generally more susceptible to parasites than adult horses. Exposure begins early. Some parasites can be transferred in the mare's milk. Other parasite eggs can be shed in the mares manure, therefore de-worming your mare shortly after foaling is recommended as the first step in protect-

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ing your foal from parasites. De-worm foals beginning at 6-8 weeks of age and again in two months.

Strangles	5-6 months of age, booster in 3-4 weeks
Tetanus	5-6 months of age, booster in 3-4 week

## **Sabrina Hanan uses her horse in her clinics,** *by Nancy Winget*

On March 15th Sabrina Hanan, MA ABS presented a program addressing her work as a business coach and organizational development consultant. She is hosting a clinic on March 24<sup>th</sup> which is open to the public, all proceeds from the clinic will go to BCH. The clinic is limited to 10 participants, interested parties should contact Sabrina at 406 223-3663.

Sabrina's partner in her clinics is an 8 ½ year old gelding named Comet. Comet came to Sabrina as his herd was being improperly cared for, and she was lucky to find him! His dam is a Montana Travel horse, his sire a Wilder Cruise Mission horse.

Sabrina has a Bachelor's degree in Psychology and a Masters Degree in Applied Theory. In addition she has received extensive training as a Behavioral Analyst through the FBI. She and Comet work with clients as coaches. Specifically Sabrina helps business persons relate their work frustrations and issues to the frustrations they may feel working with Comet.

Sabrina uses Comet as horses are herd animals, and as such have learned to be sensitive to both their environment and other herd

members. People react to horses with fewer defenses than they do to other people. As a result people often remember lessons taught by horses better than lessons taught by other people. For example, Comet teaches people in leadership roles to be more patient/slow down in their work environment.

In her work Sabrina uses a four part matrix which can be used to rate horses and riders in one of four quadrants. The quadrants are: able and unwilling, unwilling and unable, unable and willing, and willing and able. She led us on a discussion of each quadrant, and how experience, training, physical ability, etc., places each horse and each rider in one of the quadrants. These quadrants obviously relate directly to the workforce, and how employees and leaders can be placed in the same quadrants.

What have horses taught us? To be trustful, to be consistent, to be patient. For example, a 200 pound man cannot "force" a 1,500 horse to cross water. But with trust, patience, and possibly another horse as an example, the horse can choose to cross the water, and let the man ride with him! As a person in a leadership role, we can learn from horses!

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**BCH Board Meeting - March 1, 2007**

Meeting called to order at 7 PM by Dan Marsh. In attendance were: Dan Marsh, Jiffie Hale, Chick Hale (Dan Alderman proxy), Brenda Kessler, Rich Winget, Wally Becker, Bill Steinman, Larry Thomas, Jim Albright. Guests: Sonja Berg.

Minutes: Minutes of the February 1<sup>st</sup> meeting approved as corrected.

Treasury report: Dan Marsh presented at bill for \$15 for state registration of the club- approved. \$41.04 to InstyPrints - approved. \$64.89 to Beth Merrick 2006 NL- approved.

No Correspondence

Membership: Bob advised that we have one new member. He is creating a packet for new members. Rich Inman is trying to reach Jenny Tuthill to obtain previously compiled new member packets. Jiffie made a motion that John McIlhattan be approved an honorary club member. Motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Issues: Dan Marsh advised that the Right to Ride bill has not been introduced.

House Bill 1018 - National Animal Identification has been amended to make it a non-mandatory issue. Back Country Landing Strip Access Act, if approved, will allow general aviation access to all Federal Land.

Publicity: Maggie was unable to attend the meeting, Jiffie reported for her.

A flyer with logo was presented for consideration, the half page colored flyer would be attached to applications for prospective members. The flyer includes a contact name and number as well as the BCHMT web site. Maggie is working on a brochure to be presented for approval to the board.

Jiffie contacted non-paid members and is getting a great response - folks are paying their dues.

Newsletter: Jiffie is working on locating a copy of our Club Charter. Sonja has taped copies of old meetings, anyone interested in viewing should contact her.

Trail Crews: Chick talked to Brian, and Jose called Dan regarding the BCH status with the Forest Service. We will retain our volunteer relationship with the FS, Brian will present a list of trails for work to BCH.

Janice Cartwright is holding clinics at the Fairground at 1 PM on Wednesday for members interested in riding and improving trail skills.

Programs: Dan advised that a program chairperson is still needed.

The April program is open - Rich Winget advised that he will confirm a presentation on conditioning by Misty Radue.

The club needs a trainer for Leave No Trace .

Old Business: Gallatin Travel Plan Appeal: Dan and a few members attended a meeting Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> to address the appeals. Some trails that were closed (such as the "M") were dropped from our appeals. The others (Porcupine, Buffalo Horn, and Lava Lake) are still in our appeal, requesting that the FS work with BCH to keep them open to stock use.

Sabrina clinic: Sabrina is asking the club \$35 for the rental of the arena, all proceeds from her clinic will go to the club.

Chapter Summary Report: Dan Marsh submitted the report.

Trailer Decals: Rich Inman donated money to the club to purchase 30 decals.

New Business:

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Insurance: Dan has reviewed the policy used by the Gallatin Saddle and Harness club and compared it to the policy we currently have. The GSH policy does not cover trail riders, the premium is \$725 annually. Our current policy is \$400 annual and covers 5 events for \$1million in liability. The club normally has three events per year. Dan will bring the renewal details to the next meeting for review.

Defensive Horsemen Clinic: A chairperson is still needed for the course. Jiffie will contact Janice Cartwright to see if she is willing to chair. The board determined that no meals will be served at the clinic. Discussion held regarding opening the clinic to the public, no decision was made, will be addressed at the general membership meeting. The Fairgrounds requires a \$500 retainer, insurance, and \$28 per hour for use of the indoor arena. Weather permitting, the clinic will be held outside. Rich Winget agreed to contact the Red Cross to obtain a certified trainer for the human safety portion of the event.

BCHMT Convention: Delegates must register by March 8 to obtain discounted fee. To date we have 4 delegates: Dan and Alice Marsh, Bob Steinman and Rich Inman. The club can have up to eight delegates.

Display Board: The "Horse" display board was presented and approved. Members are requested to submit pictures to be displayed on the board. Dan has raffle tickets available.

Yellowstone Rides: Bob will host overnight rides in Yellowstone for the club after July 1<sup>st</sup>. He will announce the trips at the General Meeting to determine membership interest.

### **BCH General Meeting - March 15, 2007**

Meeting called to order by President Dan Marsh.. Six guests were introduced: Denise and Phil Aumann, Mary Kay Flanagan, and Dave Andreassi, Kathy Coleman, and Nancy McMarrow.

Minutes of the February 15<sup>th</sup> general meeting and the March 1<sup>st</sup> Board meeting were approved as printed in the Newsletter.

Treasure's report: submitted by Brenda Kessler and approved. Dan Marsh advised that he will contact Agri-Risk to renew liability insurance. Last year the annual premium was \$400.00.

Correspondence: Insty-Prints advised that our request for a grant was denied. Coggins cert.- see page 3  
Standing Committee Reports:

Membership: The club welcomed four new members: Denise and Phil Aumann, Mary Kay Flanagan and Dave Andreassi. Suggestion was made that we all wear name tags at meetings to facilitate meeting and getting to know each other.

Issues: Rich Inman advised that the Horse Slaughter Act was not passed. Growing concern among members that horses will be mistreated rather than sent to slaughter unless the Act is approved.

Publicity: Maggie announced a new member contest starting the first of the year, prize and ending date TBD. She also provided colorful half page cards to all members. These cards can be used to approach potential members, or posted in business, arenas, etc. The cards provide the website, and a spot for the members name and telephone number. She is also working on a brochure.

Newsletter: Jiffie will always welcome information for the newsletter.

Trails Crews: Chick provided a copy of a letter that being sent to any member that indicated an interest in serving on a trail crew. He is hoping to organize several small crews that can work during the week. The Forest Service will be giving the club a fixed list of trails on which we can work. Any member interested



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in trail work is encouraged to contact Chick. Rick Inman pointed out that members can work on trails with or without horses.

Old Business:

Travel Plan Appeal: Dan Marsh reported that a letter of assurance was received from Becky Heath of the Forest Service agreeing that the Rangers can waive seasonal closures and will use BCH to open trails. Two exceptions—Lava Lake and Pinecreek. These trails will be closed to horses during the summer. Exception - if a horse rider needs to access these trails due to an emergency, the FS will not ticket the rider(s). A motion was made/seconded/approved to drop our Appeal. Dan will notify the FS that the Appeal is dropped.

Resolutions: Discussion was held regarding the 7 Resolutions that will be voted on at the Convention. The club provided the following voting direction to the delegates: Resolution 1 - approve; Resolution 2 - approve; Resolution 3 - approve; Resolution 4 - do not approve; Resolution 5 - leave to delegate's discretion based on final verbiage of resolution; Resolution 6 - approved; Resolution 7 - do not approve.

New Business:

Sabrina Hanan volunteered to be the program chair - thank you Sabrina! Rich Winget secured Misty Radue to speak in April; Sabrina secured Kathy Colman to speak in May; Bob Steinman will secure a Vet to speak in June; No speaker is required in December due to the Christmas party

Poker Ride: The club still needs a chairman or co-chairman for the July poker ride.

Defensive Horseman Clinic: Janice Cartwright agreed chair the course set for April 21<sup>st</sup>. Course will be held from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, limited to 120 people and 60 horses. There will be no charge for the course but donations will be accepted. Rich Winget secured a Red Cross trainer for the human health section. Janice secured a vet for the horse health section. Janice will need a check for \$500 and certification of insurance in order to secure the Fairgrounds.

BCHMT Convention: The club can send two more delegates - if interested please contact Dan Marsh.

The display board looks great - thanks to all that worked to hard to make it special. Please send pictures to Dan, looking for large pictures rather than several small pictures.

Announcements: Ken Yankelevitz urged members to attend a hearing on Tuesday at 9am regarding the Four Dot arena.

Bob Steinman is willing to facilitate overnight trips to Yellowstone but needs to apply for permits now. If interested please contact Bob directly.

Janice Cartwright announced that she will host riding at the Fairgrounds on Monday nights from 5 - 8 PM. A donation is requested to cover the rental charge for the indoor arena.
