MINUTES OF MARCH 2018 MEETING

FINANCE

Carmen reported on the club checking and savings accounts. She recently received some bills for payment. Chris reported that we have filed our annual report with the Montana Secretary of State as well as the necessary federal tax-exempt form.

OLD BUSINESS

NATIONAL FOREST VOLUNTEER TRAINING

Hello everyone,

We have figured out some training dates for volunteers coming up in May. These training are for volunteers who will need to operate a chainsaw or crosscut saw while working on National Forest Projects. If folks just want to carry their saw with them when they ride that is different than working as a volunteer and they do not need to be certified by us. Please be clear with your members that not everyone needs to be certified as a sawyer. There is plenty of other work to do on trails other than saw. If people are interested in saw work they must be willing to play by all of the Forest Service safety regulations when working, stay current with their certifications, and report all work done to the district. Folks who are working with crosscut saws only need to have one certified sawyer on the saw and the second person can assist without being certified. Anyways, here are the dates for May.

1st Aid/CPR for sawyers – American Heart Association certification. Good for 2 years. All sawyers operating a chainsaw or crosscut must have current 1st Aid/CPR certification.

May 5th, Saturday, 9:00am at the Bozeman Ranger District

May 21st, Monday evening, 5:30pm at the Bozeman Ranger District

Chainsaw & Crosscut training – Good for 3 years. Class size is limited to 8 people per class. We will meet at the office for a short classroom portion before heading out into the field and cutting. Sawyers will be evaluated at the field training and may receive certification.

May 13th, Sunday, 8:30am – 4:00pm at the Bozeman Ranger District.

May 19th, Saturday, 8:30am – 4:00pm at the Bozeman Ranger District.
