SOUTH COTTONWOOD AUGUST 28 & SEPTEMBER 1

Dan Marsh, Mark DeOpsomer and John Mutter met a USFS trail crew at the South Cottonwood trailhead. After we loaded their considerable pile of gear onto 3 pack horses, we headed up South Cottonwood to the Blackmore and Storm Castle Ridge Trail junction where we left them to set up their camp. The round trip was about 17 miles. We had to clear out 5 trees along the way to their camp.

Mark DeOpsomer, John Mutter, and Kenji Aoki riding shotgun returned the following Friday, September 1st with only 2 pack horses to pack them out. With a short side trip to the Fox Creek Cabin the return trip was about 19 miles. Dan was off hunting Grouse in Plentywood. The FS crew had packed a lot of the gear into the space that their food had taken going in. John was skeptical whether or not we could get everything that required 3 horses going in onto only 2 horses coming out, but we managed. The FS crew did a bang up job while they were there. They managed to open the Storm Castle Ridge trail all the way up to the top. Good work guys!

















TWIN CABINS —PORCUPINE MEADOWS—ELKHORN—RED CLIFF CAMPGROUND SEPTEMBER 13

On September 13 the Wednesday crew led by Dan Marsh along with Tim Butler and Kenji Aoki started at Twin Cabins then to Porcupine Meadows and on to Elkhorn to the Red Cliff Campground for an 11-mile clearing project. We cut out 37 trees and did some brushing when we stopped to clear the trees. We went through 2 batteries for the electric chainsaw and half a tank of gas in the Johnsrud. We ran across a hunting camp up on top of the meadows and found a couple of bad mud bogs along the way. We also got to some puncheons on the Elkhorn trail that were newly installed, but the horses wouldn't use them because they had foot long gaps in between 3-foot puncheons which to the horses looked like a cliff. Luckily there wasn't any mud or water near the puncheons, so the horses just went around them. We left at 9:00AM and got back to Twin Cabins at 4:45PM. We were in rain off and on most of the day and the trail was really muddy on the Elkhorn trail.

















CACHE CREEK TRAILHEAD CORRALS SEPTEMBER 14 & 15

The corrals at the Cache Creek Trailhead have been in disrepair for years. All of the gates sagged and most of the bottom rails and some of the middle rails were broken off. Other users, over the years, had tied them up with bail string and wire. All in all, it was a mess. So...... I went up Friday afternoon Sep 15th to get it done. Saturday morning I was met by Lew Goodpasture, Larry Thomas, Curt Settergren, and Tim Butler. They came ready to work. We re-hung all 4 gates correctly and then re-attached most of the bottom rails with 3/8"x8" lag screws. Many of the other rails needed to be re-attached with lags as well. With 5 of us working, it didn't really take too long to complete the project. So, afterward, we sat around my camper and told stories until it was time for everyone to head home. I stayed over till Sunday and added a few more lags where I thought they would do the most good. All in all, the corrals look to be in good shape. They're certainly better than they were before. I personally think it's important to keep structures that we built and have our name on, in good shape and looking good for the public. Call it pride if you like but if you put your name on it, you own it!













JEROME ROCK LAKE TRAIL SEPTEMBER 20

The Wednesday Crew led by Lew Goodpasture along with Dan Marsh, Larry Thomas, Laurie Connelly, Tim Butler, and Bruce May on a tip from Larry that there were down trees on the Jerome Rock Lake trail headed out to do some clearing. We started on #407 and turned onto #410 had lunch at Jerome Rock Lake and decide to go back via High Lakes trail #413 to #407. The total trip was 17.4 miles with 3500 feet of elevation gain, and we cut out 23 trees varying from saplings up to 24 inches in diameter. The air was brisk below 40 degrees when we started but ended up being a comfortable 70 degrees as the day went on. We started out at 9:00AM and got back to the trailers at 5:30PM. We cut out around ten trees before we got to Jerome Rock and another 13 on the High Lakes trail. Overall, it was a wonderful day for a ride, and everyone got some good exercise removing deadfall.

RAMSHORN LAKE CORRAL PROJECT

Greetings to all,

A good number of you have heard about the Ramshorn Lake Corral project and we've discussed it in some meetings. I would like to lay out some kind of outline of events to start and finish this project. But, to do that I need to know how many would seriously consider volunteering to help. So this email is to describe, in vague detail, what this project would require from us.

The mission is to rebuild and enlarge the existing set of corrals which are the first corrals you come to as you ride up Ramshorn Lake trail and approach the lake. There are two corrals, one is a bit east of the other which we are not working on. We are only working on the west most set of corrals, which I'll refer to as "corrals". The existing corrals are approximately 60' x 40'. Presently it is only one lot with no partition fence. Almost all of the existing fence is leaning or already on the ground. The existing posts are probably 6' posts set in the ground 2 ft for a 4' tall fence (it's easier to pack 6' posts than 8'). When we finish the existing corral will be divided into two corrals and we are adding additional fence to make a third corral lot. This will extend back into the timber to the south of the existing lots. We will add new gates to each of the three corral spaces. The work will include either pulling existing posts straight or pulling them out, digging out existing holes, then putting old posts back in. Most of the fence rails will be replaced once posts have been straightened or reset. New posts into new holes will be required for the new partition fence in the old area and some at the old south existing end fence that will become the partition fence to the new area. And then the new area will require new posts (in new holes) & rails on three sides. The new extension to the existing corral will extend beyond the existing corral about 35'. All of the fence posts, rails, and screws have been delivered to the site via helicopter. We will need to pack necessary

All of the fence posts, rails, and screws have been delivered to the site via helicopter. We will need to pack necessary tools, overnight gear, food and any other necessities by horseback. We can use electric tools, chain saws, generators, etc as this area is not in a wilderness area

I want to find out who and how many might be interested in working on this project next summer. It will be the best use of our time to camp there near the lake for 3 or 4 days each time we go.

I would like to ride to the corral site on Sunday this week to assess the project and get some input from you as to how to proceed. I may take a post hole digger and shovel to do some exploratory digging while we're there.

Please let me know if you are interested in riding to the work site this week and/or working on the project next summer, most likely after July 4th, 2024.

We will be ready to ride on Sunday at 9 am, meeting at the Buffalo Horn Trailhead.**

Thanks for thinking about this. We could really use the help and the input.

Please reply if you have any comments or suggestions.
