WE CAN LEARN FROM THIS

Recently, I received the following message on our BBCHMT Facebook page: "Hello! This is kind of a strange question, my name is Whitney Edwards, my dad is David Edwards and I know he is a part of the Beartooth Back Country Horsemen. He went into hunting camp at Mystic Lake on Friday. My Sister and I were under the impression he was coming back out yesterday. He went with John Jenkins, does anyone know Johns wife's name? We don't know her and she's the one with their hunting plan."

I was able to obtain Louise's phone number (thank you Nancy) and forward it to Whitney. It was a simple misunderstanding. John and David planned for and safely returned as planned, but Whitney thought they were returning a day earlier.

What can we learn from this? Hats off to Whitney. She was worried and figured out a way to get the information she needed to calm her fears. She is obviously a very resourceful young lady.

Verbal details can be forgotten or misinterpreted, especially when we are concerned about a loved one. When we head to the Wilderness, we need to communicate in writing where we are going, who we are going with, when we plan to return home, and provide contact information of a family member for each member of the party. If you have a satellite device, instruct family members how to contact you. When I travel Frank knows that once I am settled in safely at camp, I turn my device off. I turn it back on before heading out in the morning. As he has my Garmin Share weblink, he can follow my activity once I head out again in the morning. I always have it turned on while I am riding Beau.

I was glad that everything worked out for the Edwards. We can all learn from this simple misunderstanding. To be honest, I was very touched that Whitney reached out as soon as she did. She obviously cares a lot for her father. That's a good thing.

CAMPING BREAKFAST BURRITOS

In the spring, I will make several dozen burritos and keep them in the freezer. It is handy for spur of the moment camping trips. They are also handy to have around for those, "what am I going to make for dinner" moments.

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 TABLESPOON OLIVE OIL
- 1 CUP FROZEN HASH BROWNS
- 8 OZ COOKED HAM, DICED
- 12 EGGS
- 1 TABLESPOON TACO SEASONING
- 1 (4.5 OZ) CAN GREEN CHILES
- 2 CUPS (8 OZ) SHREDDED CHEDDAR CHEESE
- 1/4 CUP CHOPPED CILANTRO
- 8 (12-INCH) FLOUR TORTILLAS

INSTRUCTIONS

HEAT THE OLIVE OIL IN A LARGE SKILLET. ADD THE HASH BROWNS AND COOK FOR 1
MINUTE, STIRRING CONTINUOUSLY. ADD IN THE HAM. CONTINUE TO COOK, STIRRING
OCCASIONALLY, UNTIL THE HASH BROWNS AND HAM HAVE BOTH BROWNED, ABOUT 8-10
MINUTES.

MEANWHILE, IN A LARGE BOWL, LIGHTLY WHISK THE EGGS. WHISK IN THE TACO SEASONING. WHEN THE HASH BROWNS AND HAM HAVE BROWNED, POUR THE EGGS INTO THE SKILLET. COOK, STIRRING FREQUENTLY, UNTIL THE EGGS HAVE SET. STIR IN THE GREEN CHILES, CHEESE AND CILANTRO.

WARM THE TORTILLAS. PUT 1/8 OF THE EGG MIXTURE DOWN THE CENTER OF EACH TORTILLA. ROLL UP LIKE A BURRITO AND WRAP TIGHTLY IN FOIL AND FREEZE.

WHEN READY TO COOK, PLACE WRAPPED BURRITOS IN HOT COALS NEXT TO FIRE. LET THE BURRITOS SIT IN THE COALS, TURNING ONCE, UNTIL HEATED THROUGH, ABOUT 10-15 MINUTES. (THE TIME WILL DEPEND ON HOW HOT YOUR FIRE IS.)

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
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
