
NATIONAL DIRECTOR

OCTOBER MEETING MINUTES

Board Meeting October 2nd, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 6:38pm at the Stillwater County Chamber of Commerce.

In attendance: Randy Thomsen, Clark Linn, Scott Fluer, Bill Yager, Jon Shamel and Sarah Lewis. Motion to approve the July board meeting minutes made by Jon Shamel. The motion was seconded by Bill Yager. No discussion. Motion carried.

President's Report: Randy reported that he mailed the BLM letters to MT & WY. He sent the out check for the museum donation to the State Board. Back Country Horsemen have raised approximately \$22,000 throughout the state for the back country horsemen museum.

Vice President's Report: Nothing to report.

Treasurer's Report: Report delayed due to technical issues with Yellowstone Bank. Jon will bring report to November board meeting for approval.

Committee Reports

2027 Convention: Melissa Codner (chair). Randy received the BCHMT timeline for convention. He will get to Melissa to confirm with her current timeline. Convention preview slide show needs to be made for BCHMT convention spring of 2026.

Activities: Sarah Lewis (chair). Christmas party to be held Saturday, December 13 th, 2025, at Hannah Hall in Fishtail, MT. CPR certification tentatively to be held February 2026, Clark Linn looking in to scheduling a class. There is now a Defensive Horsemanship Class online. We will start using it for new members. BBCH will hold an in-person class in 2027. Discussion of moving board meetings to Joliet community center for a more central meeting location for board members. Cost is \$20.00 per usage. Clark Linn read the rental agreement. Motion to move the board meetings to the Joliet Community Center beginning January 2026 made by Clark Linn. Seconded by Scott Fluer. No discussion. Motion carried. Discussion of Youth Packing Clinic and need for planning meeting. Sarah will organize planning meeting for December.

Education: BBCH began a series of packing education classes at our general meetings. Going well so far. Discussion of how to increase general meeting attendance including the day, time, and location of meetings. Randy is planning to bring this up for discussion at our next general meeting to get the members' input. Discussion of creating a poll for members' opinions to give out at the Christmas Party and put out as a poll Facebook. Scott Fluer and Sarah Lewis will draft a questionnaire and poll

Projects: Jon Shamel (chair). No updates.

Communications: Randy Thomsen (chair). Nothing to report.

Election Committee: Reported that there is enough interest to fill all open positions. 3 Local Board positions, 1 State alternate, and 1 State Board. Elections will be held at November's general meeting.

Unfinished Business:

Belfry Access- BLM is still working on getting the trailhead project funded. They are currently working on a clearance form for a Sage Grouse Impact Study. Scott Fluer is working on and "Approach Permit" with the BLM. 1500 tons of gravel is secured by Jenny Alexander (BLM). Jenny is hoping to use BLM maintenance operator to spread this gravel. Volunteer work may be needed to fence the perimeter. Currently working with a 60–90-day project estimate. They are hoping to have a Grand

Opening in the spring of 2026. Clark Linn requested Scott Fluer to speak to BLM to see if there are any new grants available. Discussion of fundraising ideas to help complete this project.

New Business:

Discussion about raising our membership dues to match Montana State's (BCHMT) dues. This would raise our chapters' dues by \$5.00 per tier. Motion to increase our Beartooth Back Country Horsemen Chapter's membership dues to \$30.00 (individual), \$40.00 (family), and \$45.00 (business) made by Clark Linn. Discussion of state's dues for 2026 and our \$500.00 state donation per year to make up for our current lower dues. Discussion of needing to budget funds for trail projects each year instead of making up for lower dues. The motion was seconded by Bill Yager. Motion carried. Discussion of which trailheads need work. This will help us to plan our projects for 2026 season. Discussion of creating a Trailhead Access Map. This would include location, directions, trailer access, and in-depth trail information. An example was shared from the Shoshone Club. Discussion of how to communicate better for our 2026 projects to get more participants. Goal of utilizing the information in the newsletter better.

State Update: Nothing to report.

Motion to adjourn made by Randy Thomsen. Motion seconded by Clark Linn.

Meeting adjourned at 7:52pm. Next meeting October 10th at 6:30pm in Columbus.
