HORSES OR MULES?

Should I Pack Horses or Pack Mules?

I am asked this question regularly. Coincidentally, the only people who ever ask this question are those who have never owned a mule. That says a lot. However, my standard answer is this: if you own a horse that is just standing around burning hay, pack him. But if you are shopping for a pack animal, buy a pack mule. Why? Remembering that stock users, including me, are opinionated, here are my reasons:

- Pack mules are born followers. A pack mule will follow a horse or another mule almost anywhere.
- While some pack horses have a tendency to daydream and step off the trail, pack mules know exactly where they are going to put down each foot.
- Pack mules carry a load without a lot of swaying and lunging.
- Pound for pound, pack mules are tougher than pack horses.
- I never have to shoe my pack mules. I just keep them trimmed, which saves me money.
- Pack mules know their job and want to do it.
- Pack mules generally have a 20-30% longer useful life than pack horses.
- Pack mules are easier keepers than pack horses for the most part.
- Last, but not least, they are cute.

President's Report:

Committee Reports

2027 Convention: Melissa Codner (chair). The slideshow preview for the 2026 convention is being created by Melissa C. Theme still being discussed. Discussion of what the theme means to the event and how it influences the whole convention. Ideas for speakers and breakout sessions were discussed.

Convention 2026 will be held March 27,28, & 29th in Bozeman, MT. Information, packets, and raffle tickets will be available soon.

Activities: Sarah Lewis (chair). Christmas party update including RSVP list. Member questionnaire was shared by Scott F. This will be available at the Christmas party and online. Discussion about holding year-round meetings to keep members in the habit of attending regularly. Also how to advertise special speakers and events to boost attendance. Discussion of Youth Packing Clinic and need for planning meeting. Sarah will organize planning meeting. Discussion of providing more business updates at the general meeting. Discussion of upcoming First Aid Training to be held in Red Lodge. Clark Linn is heading up this effort.

Education: Sean Chepulis (chair). The ongoing Packing Education series will continue through February. Discussion of teaching how to pack unusual items and camp etiquette.

Projects: Jon Shamel (chair). Belfry Trailhead Project update. BLM will haul gravel needed for the parking lot area. Discussion of logistics, permits, access, and timeline of the project.

Communications: Randy Thomsen (chair). Nothing to report.

Unfinished Business:

Jon Shamel and Clark Linn will work together to draft a letter about the dues increase and paying your dues in a timely manner. This will include an updated membership form (updated by Clark Linn).

There will be a "Pay your Dues Today" drawing for a new bridle at the Christmas Party. Discussion of how to gently encourage members to pay dues at the beginning of each calendar year. Discussion of Trailhead Improvements to support next year: Red Lodge Creek (road improvements) & Cottonwood (road improvements, hitching rails, signage, and small trailhead improvements).

Discussion of the access guide for local trails and how to move forward with this.

New Business:

Checking account's signature card needs to be updated for 2026. This will include President (Sean Chepulis), Treasurer (Clark Linn), and Secretary (Sarah Lewis).

Sean Chepulis will report our new board members to BCH Montana State.

The website and newsletter will need to be updated with new board members as well- Sarah will take care of this. Discussion of getting BBCH waivers signed at the general meeting as soon as possible in the year 2026. This will ensure all members are up to date. Clark Linn will head this effort.

Scott Fluer presented a letter to support Congressman Zinke's stance on keeping public lands open to the public. Scott will add some suggested edits and represent to the board before sending.

New location of the BBCH board meetings will be at the Joliet Community Center in Joliet, MT. This will begin with the January 8th board meeting.


