

6 Best-Ever Tips for Winter-Riding Fun

Are you a fair-weather rider? Or do you love to log saddle time even when the weather is frosty? Here are our essential tips for winter riding fun with your horse.

1. Take it easy.

When the weather's cold and the ground is hard (and perhaps snowy), focus on staying safe and comfortable, and simply enjoying the moment. A quiet walk through a snowy field can be as satisfying as a gallop if you use all your senses to be fully aware of the scents, sounds, and vistas of your ride.

Be aware, too, that riding through snow, especially if it's deep, can be tiring for your horse—another reason to take it easy. And because post-ride cooldowns can be problematic in frigid temps (more on that in a moment), keeping your horse from working up a big sweat just makes good sense.

Obviously, for safety's sake, never ride over icy or otherwise slippery footing. Also, in snow, stick to areas where you know the lie of the land underneath.

2. Plan to stay warm.

The goal is to be toasty but not to break a sweat, as dampness can lead to a chill. Dress in layers you can add or subtract as needed during your ride. Good gloves are essential; and you'll be happy to have ear warmers under your hat or helmet.

Waterproof, insulated riding boots will help ward off that I-can't-feel-my-toes feeling. (Be sure whatever boot you wear is riding-safe, though, with a decent heel and a tread that won't hang up in the stirrups.) Chaps can be an extra wind shield for your legs.

For the coldest days, gel-packet hand- and foot-warmers can provide delicious heat for the duration of your ride. (Find them at sportinggoods stores or at Amazon.com.)

3. Do extra warm-up, cool-down.

Your horse's muscles and tendons require additional time to warm up in frigid temperatures, before you start asking him to struggle through snow.

After your ride, towel-dry any sweat he may've produced (again—ideally, not a lot), and make sure he's fully dry before you turn him out and/or blanket him. (A winter blanket on a damp horse defeats the purpose of blanketing.)

4. Mind the feet.

We already talked about your feet, but if you ride your horse in snow, ask your hoof-care professional about the various ways of increasing traction and avoiding ice balls in *his* feet.

Options to keep snow and ice from accumulating include special shoes or hoof pads or the application of a nonstick agent (such as bacon grease or a commercial product) to soles.

For added traction, ask about a hard-surfacing material (such as borium) applied to shoes; studs affixed to shoes; the use of horseshoe nails with ribbed heads; or hoof boots with removable studs.

5. Go bareback?

If your horse is comfortable being ridden bareback (and a cold day is NOT the right time to introduce it!), consider going without the saddle, especially for shorter rides. Your horse's heat will help to keep you warm on your walk through the winter wonderland.

6. Be smart.

Wear UV-blocking sunglasses—ideally wraparounds—to protect your eyes from glare and wind. Keep yourself and your horse adequately watered, too, as cold weather can promote dehydration. A small snack, such as a protein or granola bar, can help you stay warm during your ride by revving your metabolism for digestion.

Don't forget to warm the bit before bridling your horse—you want him to enjoy—not dread-your winter outings.

Finally, if your horse is new to snow, be aware of any signs during pauses in your ride that he's thinking about rolling in it. I actually had this happen to me during my mare's first outing in snow—she dropped so suddenly I could only focus on pushing free...then had to follow her back to the barn, on foot.

Forewarned is forearmed!

2021 Packing Course Scholarship Application

BRBCH is committed to educating people who wish to travel into the backcountry using the "leave no trace" and safe stock handling and packing methods. Smoke Elser provided packing classes for many years and developed his clinic to pass on these skills. Jordan Knudsen, who now owns the business and conducts the clinics, took Smoke's course in 2004 and has been the primary instructor for going on four years. Due to the pandemic, Smoke will only be present for this clinic intermittently.

Bitter Root Backcountry Horsemen is sponsoring two scholarships to Jordan Knudsen's packing class. (Tuition is \$450 each for the five-day course, paid by BRBCH). Attendees must supply their own transportation to class or perhaps the two attendees can carpool.

Members interested will apply to the scholarship committee and must be willing to share their new knowledge with other Chapter members on trail projects or at clinics or meetings. You need not own a packing animal to apply.

BRBCH has reserved two places. Since the course begins mid-February, the application process will begin immediately. It is a big commitment, but learning from Jordan will be a thorough introduction to packing.

In Memorium



The Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen chapter formally organized on March 17, 1976. Elections followed, and our first president was Thomas "Tom" Ford, owner of Ford's Department Store on Main Street in Hamilton. Tom was born on April 28, 1925, and he passed away at home on Nov. 21, 2020, surrounded by his family. He lived a good life and was a long-time supporter of trails and the back country. Tom spent a lot of time in his later years in the shoe department at Ford's Department

Store. If you were fortunate enough to spend time talking with him there, he was always positive and smiling, a real gentleman. Several years ago, we printed this photo of him on a trail with his horse and it is hanging on the wall in the shoe department. His name has been added to the chapter's memorial plaque at the Bitterroot Humane Association.



Pamela Kaye, mother of member Katie Williams, passed away November 12, 2020. We remember her for her support of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen. She would bring much appreciated hot meals to trailheads for our crews returning from a day out clearing and maintaining trails. We are thankful for those dedicated individuals like Pam who go the extra mile to help us accomplish our mission.

Stewart Brandborg Montana Outdoor Hall of Fame 2020 Inductee

Stewart Monroe Brandborg arrived in the Bitterroot Valley as a 10-year-old boy.

In an interview 70 years later, the man everyone called "Brandy" remembered it as a paradise with mountains to climb, forests to explore and a place inhabited by farming and logging families who shared common values.

Often credited as a force behind the passage of the 1964 Wilderness Act, Brandborg served in top posts with the Wilderness Society, the National Wildlife Federation and the National Park Service in the 1950s through the 1980s. After he retired to the Bitterroot Valley in 1986, Brandborg volunteered on preservation and land management efforts. He died in April 2018.

A young Brandborg learned his conservation ethic from his father, Guy Brandborg, who served as the Bitterroot National Forest supervisor from 1935 to 1955.

His youth was filled with long pack trips through the Sapphires. When his father took the family fishing up the west-side canyons, he advised that they keep their hooks dry until they walked at least three miles to ensure the crowd had been left behind.

The elder Brandborg was a friend of Gifford Pinchot, the Forest Service's first chief, as well as Bob Marshall, the wilderness preservation pioneer and founder of the Wilderness Society. They shared values of protecting wilderness, sustainable timber harvests, land planning, stream protection and community involvement at a time when Forest Service policy favored clear-cutting.

A wildlife biologist by training, Stewart Brandborg **credited his two summers** spent on a groundbreaking study of mountain goats in a remote piece of the Bob Marshall Wilderness for opening the door for his later employment with the National Wildlife Federation in Washington, D.C. It was there he met his mentor, Howard Zahniser, the federation's executive director who recruited Brandborg as a member of the Wilderness Society's Governing Council in 1956, the same year Zahniser drafted the first version of the Wilderness Act. Four years later Zahniser hired Brandborg to a staff position on the Wilderness Society where he worked toward the goal of passing the wilderness legislation through Congress.

When Zahniser died in May 1964, Brandborg was selected as his successor as Wilderness Society executive director. In September of that same year Brandborg was there when President Lyndon Johnson signed the Wilderness Act into law.

Initially, the legislation was a disappointment to some in the conservation community. Many were expecting 50-60 million acres to be protected in that first round. Only 9 million acres in 13 states were set aside.

"Part of Brandy's genius turned this seeming defeat into an incredibly powerful tool to build and expand and activate the wilderness movement across the nation", wrote Wilderness Watch conservation director Kevin Proescholdt. "Brandy embarked on a years-long process of identifying local wilderness supporters, organizing them, training them on the Wilderness Act and turning them loose on their state's congressional delegations to push for new areas to be added to the Wilderness System."

By the time Brandborg left the Wilderness Association in 1976 there were 70 new wilderness areas in 31 states. Today, 803 wilderness areas in 44 states protect nearly 112 million acres.

"I learned, we learned that you work with the folks in local areas, the people who live in the areas under consideration," Brandborg said in a 2010 interview with the Ravalli Republic. "It was a success because we organized a massive grassroots campaign and we talked to people — _they fished, they hunted, they hiked these places — _from stockmen to the wilderness purists they wanted to know that wilderness was going to be here and preserved for future generations."

From there, Brandborg explained how their collective voices had power.

"The hot oil of public pressure poured down the backside of the people in Congress will make believers of them," Brandborg said. "The pressure of people who care for the environment and the wonderful world we live in can make change. It is then that message becomes clear."

BACKCOUNTRY KITCHEN



Wild Duck Breast in Honey & Balsamic Vinegar from Pinterest.com

For all you duck hunters out there

Ingredients

- 2 duck breast fillet (with skin)
- · Salt and pepper
- 3 Tbsp honey
- 4 Tbsp balsamic vinegar
- Chopped walnuts (optional)

Directions

 Cut small slits in the skin of the duck breasts, making sure the flesh is not damaged. Season with salt and pepper.

- Heat a heavy based (preferably iron) frying pan and put the duck breasts into it skin-side down. Sear them for a couple of minutes, then turn the heat down and fry for another 5 minutes.
 Turn them over and cook for a further 3-5 minutes, depending on how well-done you like your duck. Transfer them to a plate and rest under cover.
- Pour the duck fat away (keep this for cooking other dishes) then add the honey and balsamic vinegar. Using a wooden spoon scrape up all the browned bits and reduce the sauce to a thick syrup. This will take about 2-3 minutes.
- 4. Return the duck breasts back to the pan, coat them evenly with the glaze by turning them around a few times.
- 5. Put the glazed duck breasts onto a plate and slice them diagonally.
- 6. Serve them with the remaining syrup and chopped walnuts if you like.

TRAINING DATES

Defensive Horsemanship training is required for any member wishing to ride their equine on a Forest Service trail project. (It is not required for club trail rides.) Once earned, the card is good for 3 years. Defensive Horsemanship clinics will again be held at the C-Max Stables in Corvallis, on Bass Lane, off Eastside Highway. The dates are as follows:

May 1, 2021 from 9 AM to 2 pm **Demonstration**: Learn packing skills, Equine First Aid, and several other topics of interest to safe trail riding. Required for people earning a new DH card or will count as a renewal for current card holders.

May 8 and 15: **Obstacle Courses**: Four sessions (9 AM-noon, or 1-4 PM) will be offered, with 8-10 people in each session. This is the riding part of earning a Defensive Horsemanship card and you will bring your own horse, mule, or donkey. While first time card applicants will get first choice, there is generally room for current DH card holders to participate for a "spring tune-up."

BITTER ROOT BACK COUNTRY HORSEMEN DRAFT GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, December 17, 2020

The December 2020 general meeting of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen (BRBCH) was called to order by President Gene Merrell at 7:01 pm. The meeting was held online using Zoom Meeting. There were 29 members present. Gene Merrell led the Pledge of Allegiance to start the meeting.

BUSINESS

Minutes: Gene asked if there were any updates to the October and November 2020 General meeting minutes. Katie Williams motioned, and Lionel Lavallee seconded to accept the October and November General meeting minutes as distributed via email. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Sandra O'Brien provided an update on the account balances. Kathy Stroppel-Holl motioned, and Dan Maiyo seconded to accept the Treasurer's report. The motion carried. Sandra is meeting with Barbara Walker to train her on the Treasurer's responsibilities.

CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Raffle: Gene discussed the meeting raffle on how general members can win a \$20 gift certificate to wherever you like.

Newsletter: There is a new format.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Issues: None to report on.

Projects: In January we will meet with the Forest Service on our projects and the Great American Outdoors Act (GAOA).

State Directors: Chuck discussed the BCH of MT Board Directors that took place in December. Currently there are still funds available from the Forest Service for training. BCHMT has 992 members and the BCHA has 12,900 members. There are 31 states that have chapters. Montana had 17,321 total volunteer hours, \$10,307 donations, and in-kind value in trail work of \$808,464. Eva-Maria Maggi, a BRBCH member, is offering her class at UM this year again. The 2020 class was not able to take place due to the COVID. Dave Sabo from the FS in Region 1 is taking over for Joni Packard due to her retiring. The GAOA has a budget in Region 1 with \$17 to \$33 million a

year. Need to discuss with our local districts on what we what to do with that and what input do we want with our local district in the future. Any resolutions need to be turned into the committee by Feb. 12th. Nominations for the Founders Award presented by the State BCH Chairman need to be submitted to Connie Long soon. Next State Directors meeting is March 27th.

Membership: There are 45 memberships and 81 members. Kathy will be sending an email reminder regarding renewals for 2021. Individuals are \$30 and the Family is \$40. Please send applications/check to our PO Box or otherwise contact Kathy to get a form and renew/pay. Brad brought that the Missoula chapter is covering their 2021 memberships.

Training: Bonnie discussed First Aid/CPR, Cross Cut or Chainsaw certifications are in a wait and see from the FS and Red Cross. Working on the Defensive Horsemanship to take place on two to three days in May. Firearm carry certifications updated with the correct spellings. Bonnie to send out the corrected certificates. 


