To Blanket or not to Blanket Part One of Two This article appeared in the Feb. 2022 Nag News

- 1. How a horse stays warm: Horses have developed very efficient means of staying warm, even in very cold temperatures. Your horse's coat is comprised of two types of hair: longer stiffer guard hairs; and a soft, fluffy undercoat. The guard hairs "guard" or protect the soft hairs from dirt and water, shed off rain, and collect moisture from sweat that might damage the undercoat. The softer, fluffier hairs of the undercoat trap warm air between and act like insulation around your horse. Natural oils are produced that coat the hair to make them water resistant. Each hair is connected to the piloerector muscle. This muscle allows the hairs to be stood up or laid flat. When they stand up, warm air trapped between them, just above the surface of the skin. When they lie down, warm air is released from between them, cooling the area above the surface of
- 2. How much winter hair will my horse get? Horses will start to grow their heavy winter coats sometime in late August in most parts of the United States. The hair growth is actually linked to the length of daylight, not the temperature. How thick their coat will grow does depend some on where you live. A horse in Florida will not grow nearly as heavy a coat as a horse in Minnesota does, but they all grow a thicker coat for winter.
- **3. How much cold can a horse tolerate?** A Canadian study found that horses can tolerate temperatures

down to 5°F before they show any drop in body temperature. However, certain conditions do change your horse's ability to keep warm. Rain and wind are the two most important. Rain will flatten the hair coat and prevent the undercoat from providing that layer of warm air. Wind will blow the warm air from the surface of the skin. Snow is less of a problem. In fact, snow will collect on your horse's coat and act as a layer of insulation.

4. When don't I need to blanket my horse?

- When he has a natural winter coat
- When he is healthy and in good body weight
- When it is not too windy or raining
- If the temperature says above 5°F

5. When do I need to blanket my horse?

- When he has been clipped for winter
- When he is sick or injured
- When he is underweight (or any "hard keeper")
- When he is older, with weight issues, or difficulty moving around
- When he has been recently moved to a colder climate (Expect it to take 10-21 days for a horse to acclimate to a new climate)
- When it is windy or rainy or both, and
- When there is no available shelter

PEMMICAN CAKES

- 1 package beef jerky
- 1 cup dried berries, such as dried blueberries, cranberries, or cherries
- 1 cup chopped nuts or sunflower seeds
- ¼ cup beef suet or vegetable shortening
- Honey to taste (1-3 teaspoons)
- 12 cup muffin tin
 - 1. Line muffin cups with paper liners (or grease cups well).

- 2. Grind or chop beef jerky into confetti size pieces to make about t cup. Melt suet or shortening in a saucepan.
- 3. Remove from heat, stir in beef jerky, dried berries, and seeds. Stir in honey.
- 4. Spoon about ½ cup of the pemmican mixture into each muffing cup. Press down firmly to make a cake, smoothing the top.
- 5. Refrigerate until well set. Serves 12

BITTER ROOT BACK COUNTRY HORSEMEN (DRAFT) GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, NOVEMBER 16TH 2023

The November 2023 general meeting of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen (BRBCH) was called to order by President Jan Bullock at 7:12 pm. The meeting was held at the Corvallis Primary School cafeteria. Approximately 55 members were present. There was an officer and board quorum. Trish Foster led the Pledge to start the meeting. There were no guests.

Jan noted that since this is a thankful time of the year, she asked folks to help out others where they see the need. Be kind and be thankful!

2024 Elections: Bonnie Morgan conducted the election process for President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, four Board Positions for 2024-2025, State Director for 2024-2025, and Alternate State Director. Ballots were completed via email or in person at the meeting. Per election protocol, Bonnie asked for nominations from the floor three times for each position. The ballot results are as follows.

For President, Jan Bullock and Christy Schram-Duggan are nominated. There were no nominations from the floor. **Brad Pollman motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded that nominations for President be closed.** After tallying the ballots, Jan Bullock was voted in.

For Treasurer, Barb Walker is nominated. There were no nominations from the floor. **Travise Grinnell motioned and Ross Posey seconded that nominations for Treasurer be closed.** After tallying the ballots, Barb Walker was voted in.

For 2024-2025 State Director, Chuck Miller is nominated. There were no nominations from the floor. Travise Grinnell motioned and Helen Engle seconded that nominations for State

Director be closed. After tallying the ballots, Chuck Miller was voted in.

For 2024 Alternate State Director, Bob Driggers and Ed Duggan are nominated. **Travise Grinnell motioned and Bonnie Duggan seconded that nominations for Alternate State Director be closed.** After tallying the ballots, Ed Duggan was voted in.

For the four 2024-2025 Board of Directors, the following candidates were nominated: Dan Brandborg, Shawn Kern, Carol Johns, Joan Scheffer, Greg Schneider, Julie Shram, and Mark Wright. **Travise Grinnell motioned and Ross Posey seconded that nominations for Board Directors be closed.** After tallying the ballots, the 2024-2025 Board members are Dan Brandborg, Joan Scheffer, Greg Schneider, and Mark Wright.

All newly elected folks, as well as any members, were invited to attend the Dec Board meeting at the Daly-Leach Chapel. Since Diane Duffie is a current Board member, the Board will determine her replacement for her remaining 2024 term at the January Board meeting.

BUSINESS

Minutes: The October minutes were printed in the November Nag News; there were no corrections. Christy Schram-Duggan motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded to accept the Sep and Oct general meeting minutes. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Barb presented the November treasurer's report. There were no updates. **Travise Grinnell motioned and Joan Scheffer seconded to accept the Oct and Nov treasurer's reports.** The motion carried.

CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Safety Moment: Bucks are in rut and not paying attention to cars. Be careful driving! Hwy 93 had 2 fatal accidents in the past few weeks. Watch out and ride as far over to the right as legal. Also, watch for folks running stop signs. Be a defensive driver.

Dec Meeting Members Raffle: Leslie is collecting items for the members raffle at the December meeting. Be sure to renew your membership in order to get a raffle ticket at the meeting.

Cook Trailer Storage: The chapter would like it to be under a roof during the winter. If anyone has available space, let Jan or Kathy know. It is currently outside at the Maiyo's home.

Haven House Pass the Hat: Jan passed the hat for Haven House, the Hamilton food pantry for which the chapter annually collects a cash donation. Dennis provided the hat that was passed around. Members donated \$205 to Haven

House. Jan will deliver this to Haven House on Friday, 11/17.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grants & Projects: Presented by Dan Brandborg. The grant committee has met with the Selway Bitterroot Frank Church (SBFC) Foundation, who has funding to work the Idaho side of one proposed project (Big Creek thru an Idaho trail to connect to Bear Creek) so a grant won't be pursued for that work; however, pack support will be provided. The other project is a loop from Fred Burr to Mill Creek with multiple switchbacks up Fred Burr, and a grant will be pursued for that work.

Issues: Presented by Carol Johns. She has looked into the shaded fuel breaks the FS is proposing for projects. They are categorical exclusions, so the NEPA process is not done. She spoke to Jacqie Parks with the Darby-Sula District and learned more about shaded fuel breaks. Further info was provided on various FS projects areas around the valley and how they would affect trails, accesses, and roads.

State Directors: Presented by Chuck Miller, who is the public lands person at the BCH MT level. The Blackfoot Clearwater Stewardship Act is in Congress. He also spoke about the SBFC Foundation, a sister organization that does similar trail work as BRBCH, and provided the 2023 trail work data the SBFC accomplished. He brought 2 copies of the definitive axe book, which he donated to the crosscut and chainsaw folks. Brad P spoke about public lands and problems/issues that will be tracked. The next State meeting will be in Dec.

Education & Training: No report.

Membership: Presented by Leslie Conner-Maiyo. There are currently 91 memberships and 144 members. Renewals have started for 2024.

Outreach: Presented by Karen Philips. Long-time member Joe Tenzer is in Discovery Center care and would appreciate any contact, letter, call, or visit. BRBCH needs to submit an article with photos for the BCH MT January newsletter.

Program: Jan Bullock will share stories from her trip to Mongolia during the December meeting. Dan B will provide a slideshow on the grant projects in Feb. Ted Hall is scheduled to speak in March on the Lewis and Clark decent trail. Need a January speaker. Will try to get one of the UM pack scholarship recipients to speak at the April meeting.

Sunshine: If anyone knows of a member who needs a get well, congratulations, or condolence card, let Cindy Beck know. Cindy's email and

phone number are listed in the chapter membership directory.

OLD BUSINESS

Pantry Partners Christmas Food Box Pack: Gene said Box Prep is Thu, Nov 30, 1-3pm, and Box Pack is Fri, Dec 1, 9am. Both are at the St Mary's Family Center. A sign up sheet was passed around. About 200 boxes will be packed.

NEW BUSINESS

BRBCH Chapter Donation for BCHA: Brad spoke about this topic at past meetings, and provided additional info on why BCHA needs the dues increase. BCH MT will discuss and vote on this measure. If passed, it will take 3 years for the revised dues to be put in place. The BRBCH Board approved a \$5 per membership donation to BCHA for 2023 to help defray expenses. Need a seconded motion from the membership to approve this. Jan noted that this donation is coming out of the chapter's account, not from the members. Helen Engle motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded to make this donation to BCH MT to go to BCHA. The motion passed with a majority of yeas and one nay.

Thank You/Monetary Gift: Jan noted that this topic has been tabled to the Dec Board meeting.

OTHER BUSINESS

Gene is looking for someone to handle the Pantry Partners food box pack next year. Leslie is looking for a replacement for membership chair.

Gene and Cheyenne will be working on the 2024 budget. Think about the organization and what is needed.

Ed Bullock will be the Cowboy Santa for the Hamilton Downtown Association. He would like some help Friday, 11/24 with crowd control around his horse. Will meet in the parking lot near the Post Office. When the tree is lit, then Santa shows up!

BITTER ROOT BACK COUNTRY HORSEMEN (DRAFT) BOARD MEETING AGENDA, DECEMBER 7TH, 2023

The December 2023 Board meeting of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen (BRBCH) was called to order at 7:05 pm by Jan Bullock. Present were President Jan Bullock, VP Christy Schram-Duggan, Treasurer Barb Walker, and Secretary Kathy Stroppel-Holl; Board members Dan Brandborg, Diane Duffie, Travise Grinnell, Dennis Hardman, Carol Johns, Joe Kirkland, Dan Maiyo, Karen Philips, and Brad Pollman (also State Director); and Alt State Director Ed Duggan. Absent were Past President Gene Merrell and State Director Chuck Miller. Greg Schneider led the Pledge.

Committee Chairs and New 2024 Officer/Board members present: Bonnie Morgan, Leslie Conner-Maiyo, Judy Posey, Greg Schneider, Mark Wright, and Joan Scheffer.

BUSINESS

Minutes: The November 2023 meeting minutes were published in the November Nag News – there were no updates. Christy Schram-Duggan motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded to accept the minutes as published. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Barb provided the account balances. There were no questions on the report. **Karen Philips motioned and Travise Grinnell**

seconded to accept the Treasurer's report. The motion carried.

CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Jan welcomed all the new 2024 officers and Board members.

Dan M noted "Chuck Wagon" has a new home at Laura McManus's barn. Thanks, Laura!

Jan said Cowboy Santa Ed, Nikawa (the pony), and the pony's Elf escort had a good time at tree lighting in Hamilton on Nov 24. Pictures were taken with Santa, the pony, and visitors. A photo of the event is on Facebook.

Leslie provided a list of 11 items she has for the December members' raffle. Barb and Jan gave additional items for the raffle.

Kathy noted that Leslie will have the key to check the PO box for memberships until the Dec general meeting. Leslie will give the key to Judy afterwards. Jan and Barb have the other 2 PO box keys.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grants: Dan spoke about the Bitterroot Wilderness Connection Project (the Mill Creek/Fred Burr loop), the MCC crew, and FS involvement. A BCHA grant was looked into that

would cover equipment, such as folding tables, chairs, and bear resistant boxes. The committee is applying for the RTP grant, and will know in Mar/Apr if it is awarded. Brad noted the BCHA grant is worth going after, and it is separate from the RTP grant. The chapter has good wilderness equipment. Christy suggested 1 set of bear boxes (have 1 set already). There are 2-3 areas for matching funds from BCHA, BCH MT, or the Flathead chapter to cover costs before the grant moneys are available. Dan discussed the proposed itinerary that will start July 1, with two 9-day hitches, how many volunteers are needed in camp (2-3 for 3 days, rotated out twice with others). The first camp will be 6 miles from the Fred Burr reservoir. Jan suggested asking the membership as to who would be interested and available. The camp volunteers would prep coffee, dinners, and oversee camp. The MCC crews are self-contained, so BRBCH volunteers would be providing a dinner every 3 days for the crew. Leslie noted a lot of members could be interested in spending 2-3 days in a camp setting like this. Stock is limited to 20 animals packing; Christy noted the stock could be taken out after packing in. Food costs per day could range from \$20-\$24/person/day. With inflation, \$25/person/day should be budgeted. Ed talked about what these crews eat on similar pack trips. There was further discussion on this project. The final suggestion was for \$30/person/day to put in the grant costs. Christy, Ed, and Travise will provide pack support. An email will be sent to the membership on this project.

Projects: It was suggested that 2024 projects be minimized due to the big project effort for the grant. Dan M noted Brand Browning would like BRBCH to do the East Fork barbed wire removal project June 21-23 or May 24-26, and the Crazy Creek Horse Facility maintenance project Aug 1-4. Brand has the EF cabin dates reserved.

Issues: Carol said Steve Brown is the new Darby/Sula district ranger (Abby Josie retired). Carol will contact Jacqie Parks regarding a FS projects map. The FS has contacted tribal entities regarding historical/archeological sites, such as the peeled Indian trees. FS winter burns will be done after the Hog Trough burn. Some national parks are attempting to replant in wilderness areas, but are being challenged on this issue. The Community Wildfire Protection Plan now has the Wildland Urban Interface buffer at 1.5 miles (change from ¼ mile) for communities.

State Directors: Brad said the state meeting is Dec 16 in Missoula, followed by a Christmas party potluck. See Brad if you have questions about BCH MT or BCHA. Kathy presented the FS Region 1 Oct/Nov year end summary newsletter, which will be emailed to the Board. Brad provided further

info on a recent BCHA letter regarding grant money.

Membership: Leslie said Cheyenne Grinnell will be the new membership chair. A list of new and renewal memberships to approve were discussed. For 2023, there are 91 memberships and 144 members. Karen Philips motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded to accept the new and renewal memberships as presented. The motion carried. For 2024, there are 29 memberships and 49 members.
