DRAFT GENERAL MEETING MINUTES,
DECEMBER 18th, 2025 PROGRAM**

The December 2025 general meeting of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen (BRBCH) was called to order by President Brad Pollman at 7:02 p.m. The meeting was held at the Daly-Leach Community Room. Approximately 29 members were present. There was a board quorum. All members led the Pledge to start the meeting. Guest: Troy Beaver.

PROGRAM

Grace Gauthier, Certified Equine Massage Therapist: Pam introduced Grace Gauthier, owner of Double G Equine Bodywork. She has varied equine experiences including English riding, jumping, liberty work and tricks training. She got her degree in Equine Science from MSU and her certification in Equine Bodywork, a three-year program. Horses have slow blood flow in winter, joints are stickier, antagonistic muscles contract more. All this causes movement problems. To combat this, bodywork helps. It can be done before or after warmups. She does massage, myofascial release, and she works trigger points. She charges \$75/hour and can arrange package rates. Bodywork benefits last about four weeks.

Members Raffle: Barb started us out with a draw for a \$100 bill from Tammany Veterinary, won by Cheyenne Raisor-Grinnell. Winners of the Scheels' \$250 gift card were Ross and Judy Posey.

BUSINESS

Minutes: The November minutes were printed in the Nag News. There were no corrections. **Helen Engle motioned and Travise Grinnell seconded to accept the November general meeting minutes as printed. Motion carried.**

Treasurer's Report: Elaine presented the December treasurer's report. There were no questions. **Kathy Stropel-Holl motioned and Julie Schram seconded to accept the December treasurer's report. Motion carried.**

CORRESPONDENCE/ANNOUNCEMENTS

Request for Letter of Support for Grant Submission: Brad reported on trail work proposed for Fred's Secret Trail System (Lick Creek area) by the Bitterroot Backcountry Cyclists. The FS has approved the proposed trails and the bicycle group asked for a letter of support from our chapter for their grant application. **Earl Philips motioned and Cherie Barton seconded that we approve a letter of support to Bitterroot Backcountry Cyclists for their grant proposal, with a request for "Share the Trail", "No E-bikes" and "No Riding After Rain" signage. Motion carried.**

Coffee/Hot Water Signup Sheet: Kathy passed around the 2026 signup sheet for coffee/hot water at general meetings.

PO Box Key: With the 2026 secretary Cheyenne's OK, Kathy passed the secretary's chapter PO box key to Barb, the membership chair as well as 2026 VP.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

State Directors: Brad and Julie attended the state meeting on Dec. 10. Discussion at the meeting centered on public lands issues and rules changes. They are requesting that local input with Matt Anderson and the new director of FS offices be scheduled. We received state convention information, including raffle items: a rifle, a quarter of beef, and a Rocky Mountain Hat Company custom hat. Elaine will have raffle tickets for members to sell. Mark Wright presented information on the rendezvous at Monture Guard Station and he got a good response.

Training: Bonnie will bring a list of members who need first aid and other training to the January 15 meeting. Brad has asked for reimbursement of \$800 from the Cost Share Agreement for our first aid costs from last year.

Membership: There are currently 72 memberships and 112 members.

Outreach: Karen thanked Jenna Wright for her efforts in getting our Christmas food box event covered in a front-page article in the Nov. 26 issue of the Bitterroot Star.

Fair: Brad met with the fair's maintenance manager; his crew will redo the fair gates using their own materials and following our chapter's recommendations. The software we used for ticket sales is being updated. We may get an increased payment for our fair work.

Projects: Helen Engle mentioned trail work on Willow Creek and a needed trail head in the Rye Creek/Skalkaho area as possible 2026 projects.

Program: Pam said the January program is Q Dehart speaking on the BLM's mustang and burro program.

Public Lands: Brad got a news release from Julie Schram on the latest schedule for Sheep Creek Mine developments, and he encouraged members to submit individual comments. The Bitterroot Water Partnership is a source of information on the proposed mine.

Sunshine: If a member needs a get well, congratulations, or condolence card, let Jenna Wright know.

2026 Board of Director Position Appointment: Brad announced that we have a one-year director position open due to Barb Walker's move from director to vice-president, and the board selected Travise Grinnell to fill it.

Sign Up for New Committee: Brad spoke about the need for a Long-Range Planning Committee for equine use in the Bitterroot. He circulated a signup sheet for the committee. Our FS supervisor has asked us for feedback and input on equine use on the Bitterroot National Forest. Brad wants us to be proactive and to host a meeting of all equine groups in the valley to get their ideas. As an example, one idea is for a Larry Creek trail (on the recently added 120 acres) that could be located higher up; that trail location could help minimize crowding.

DRAFT BOARD MEETING MINUTES, JANUARY 2nd, 2026

The January 2026 Board meeting of the Bitter Root Back Country Horsemen (BRBCH) was called to order by Diane Duffie at 7:00 pm at the Daly-Leach Community Room. Present were President Diane Duffie, Vice-President Barb Walker, Treasurer Elaine Driskoll, and Secretary Cheyenne Raisor-Grinnell; Directors Chris Carrera, Dennis Hardman, Mary Odell, Pam Ristad, Joan Scheffer, Julie Schram, and past-president Brad Pollman. Absent were directors Travise Grinnell, Ed Duggan, and Christy Schram-Duggan. There was a Board quorum. Committee chairs/members present: Bonnie Morgan, Dan Maiyo, and Earl Philips All led the Pledge.

Welcome to New Officers and Directors: Diane explained the importance of the officer and director positions and thanked the new 2026 board for giving of their time and energy.

BUSINESS

Minutes: The December 2025 minutes were published in the Nag News. There were no updates. **Dennis Hardman moved and Joan Scheffer seconded to accept the December minutes. Motion carried.**

Treasurer's Report: Elaine provided account balances. There were no updates. **Brad Pollman moved and Julie Schram seconded to accept the January treasurer's reports. Motion carried.**

CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

PO Box Keys: Diane, Barb, and Elaine have the chapter's PO box keys for 2026.

Daly-Leach Keys: Diane has the only key, and she has the backup key for the fair shed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: New and renewal memberships were presented by Barb. We did a paper ballot vote. After approval, there are 75 memberships and 118 members for 2026. The list of approved members will be attached to the printed copy of the minutes.

State Directors: Brad and Julie discussed the BCHMT convention to be held March 27-29 in Bozeman. Convention packet items were distributed. Diane asked who could handle convention needs: Diane will ask Tim Meyer if he will help Christy with the chapter convention display, photo contest details to be put together by Julie Schram, and there are no current memorials. Elaine will handle raffle ticket distribution and money collection, and she will submit the delegate reservations.

Training: Bonnie scheduled Feb 7 & Feb 28 first aid classes, 18 people are currently certified: Chainsaw certs 10, training TBD, 2 crosscut certs with training days TBD. Two days are scheduled for defensive horsemanship demo (Mar 14) and obstacle course (Apr 4) at C-Max. A third training day at Rock Creek Horse Camp with a project was proposed for May 9th or 16th. A "No Drama Llama" day is possible this summer.

Projects: Committee meets later this month. Diane will communicate with all current committee leaders.

Public Lands: Brad will meet w/Matt Anderson re: changes in the FS. Travel Management Rules and the Roadless Rule have historically included huge public input; now the rules are ordered to be rescinded. Nothing has happened yet, but that could change this month or February.

Budget: Earl provided a summary of the budget philosophy that is used to build the 2026 budget. He made suggestions regarding the CDs and arrangement of funds for ease of use and better understanding. The draft budget will be presented at the February board meeting. Earl suggested a temporary financial committee be formed, and it will include him, Elaine and one more member.

Audit: Barb, Elaine, and Nancy are on the committee and will meet at the end of the month.

Constitution: Dan said the committee met Dec 14th and continues to refine verbiage in the existing constitution to streamline it and fill in gaps. Next meeting is Jan 18th at the Stevensville Fire Hall. **(Continued next page)**

Long Range Planning Committee for Equine Use in the Bitterroot: Brad will conduct a meeting with the committee at the end of the month.

50th Anniversary Celebration Planning: Diane is pulling pieces together for a meeting with Julie, Christy, Helen, Barb, Pam, and Joan. Julie and Helen found photos. The barn on Pine Hollow in Stevi was suggested as a venue; they offer a 15% discount for non-profits. Diane has looked into the Eagles Lodge as well. Catering was discussed. Potential caterers mentioned are the UM and Trapper Creek Job Corps culinary programs.

Program: Q Dehart (Sharmaine) will describe the BLM's wild mustang/burro program.

Grants: Julie reported on an FWP grant due in January, and Brad emphasized we need to plan a year ahead to apply for this and other grants.

OLD BUSINESS

Secretary's Computer: Diane bought the computer; it cost \$399 with Word software.

Phone Numbers in Newsletter: Brad suggested we keep the numbers in the newsletter because scammers can get information in multitude places.

NEW BUSINESS

2026 State Convention Delegates: BRBCH sends 8 delegates plus one alternate. Three are taken by our state directors: Ed, Brad, and Julie. Additional delegates are Diane, Barb, Pam, Dennis, Cheyenne and alternate Christy Schram-Duggan: Registration fees are \$150/person, and early registration due date is March 1. The chapter will cover lodging for one night and mileage. Room sharing is encouraged. Saturday lunch/dinner and Sunday breakfast are covered.

2026 State Convention Auction Item: The live auction items raise money for BCHMT. The item should be worth \$100 and is contributed by every chapter. Our item was discussed: a laser engraved saw or fabricated fire ring were suggested. This request will be brought to the general membership for ideas. Brad explained how the raffle system works to help the host chapter make money by all chapters selling raffle tickets. Prizes: Rifle, 1/4 beef, custom hat. 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Understanding and Treating Scratches in Horses.

Feel like you are living in Olympia Wa.? All this rain may put your horse at risk.

Scratches in horse heels refers to a condition known as pastern dermatitis.

It can affect the heel, the back of the pastern, the fetlock, and occasionally the cannon bone. It is also known as "mud fever", "dew poisoning", "greasy heel" or "cracked heels".

The bacteria and fungi find their way into breaks in the horse's skin. The conditions for its development are excessively moist or dirty environment and repeated wetting and drying of the skin (damp, muddy pastures or wet stalls).

Which horses are at risk? Scratches isn't a fussy disease, as any horse can get it; but the condition is widely prevalent in draft horses with feathers or long fetlock hair that retain moisture. Horses with white legs are also at risk because un-pigmented skin is more susceptible to sun damage, chaffing and abrasions making it more at risk for infection.

How are scratches treated? A rule of thumb is:

"Don't scratch scratches". Carefully clip the hair away from the infected area, taking care not to scrape or break the skin. Once the area is clipped, gently wash the affected areas with an antibacterial shampoo (such as chlorhexidine, betadine, or benzoyl peroxide) or an antifungal shampoo (1-2% miconazole) and let it sit for about 10 minutes before gently rinsing. Rough scrubbing and harsh chemicals should be avoided. Scabs can be massaged off carefully, but don't pull or pick them. Using a clean towel, carefully pat the area dry and apply a topical treatment as directed by your veterinarian. Limit washing sessions to only once a day for 7-10 days. Then cut back the frequency to 2-3 times per week until resolved.

Ointments that your veterinarian will recommend for scratches include antibiotics, antifungals, steroids and other medications. In more serious cases, systemic antibiotics may be needed.

The primary defense to allow healing is a dry, clean environment. This means you may need to find an alternative living situation for your horse if he/she is fighting a case of scratches. Horses should be kept off wet pastures and housed in a clean, dry stall. Shavings should be of the large, fluffy variety. Milled shavings should be avoided as they

contain more moisture. Applying a layer of zinc-oxide based cream (ie. Desitin®) to DRY affected areas may also help soften scabs and provide a moisture barrier to allow healing to occur.

If you've been treating scratches unsuccessfully, you should call your veterinarian out to have a look. A severe lameness and/or deep wounds with swelling, excessive heat or white/yellow discharge also warrants a call to your veterinarian.

Prevention.

- Keep the footing dry inside the stall and turnout area; use dry bedding and fill in muddy areas around gates.
- Dry your horse's legs before putting him up in a stall.
- Avoid early morning turnout when there is heavy dew or frost on the ground.
- Do not use wraps or boots that will retain moisture around the infected areas. Do not share boots between horses.
- Horses with long leg hair or feathers may benefit from hair removal/clipping so that moisture and contaminants are not trapped against the skin.
- Early detection is the best medicine - check your horse's legs frequently for early signs of infection and routinely groom your horse to prevent mud build-up on legs.

Chocolate Chip Cookies

Yea, I know. Everybody knows how to make chocolate chip cookies. But here is the recipe anyhow just in case you need to be motivated to make some. Enjoy!

I like to use Ghirardelli
bittersweet chocolate chips.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup Butter or margarine, softened
- 3/4 cup Sugar
- 3/4 cup Brown sugar, packed
- 2 Eggs, large
- 2 teaspoons Vanilla
- 2 1/4 cups Flour, unsifted
- 1 teaspoon Baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon Salt
- 1 cup Walnuts or pecans, chopped (optional)

DIRECTIONS:

- Heat oven to 375°F.
- Stir flour with baking soda and salt; set aside.
- In large mixing bowl, beat butter with sugar, and brown sugar at medium speed until creamy and lightened in color.
- Add eggs and vanilla, one at a time. Mix on low speed until incorporated.
- Gradually blend dry mixture into creamed mixture. Stir in nuts and chocolate chips.
- Drop by tablespoon onto ungreased cookie sheets.
- Bake for 9 to 11 minutes or until chocolate chip cookies are golden brown.

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
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
