OFFICER PROFILES

Paul Evenson is our 2010 President. Paul retired from USDA-FS Fire and Aviation. "I had the two best jobs in the FS," he says. "A smokejumper and helicopter operations."

When he retired in 2003, he joined BCH of Missoula. He believes in our Mission Statement.

In addition to packing in supplies for club work projects, Paul packs in lookout supplies, back country



camps for former smokejumpers, for the Bob Marshall Foundation, for government dignitaries, for the Smokejumper Trail Crew projects—about anyone or anything that needs packing into Wilderness Areas. He is accompanied by his Karelian bear dog, Riikka, on these trips, as well as other BCH of Missoula members.

His favorite trail is the one into Gates Park up and over Headquarters Pass. "It is always different," he says. "Good view, maybe wind, rain and snow, but always a great. You will have to make it some time. The trail gets up really high and on the east side it is a bit steep in places. Along that trail is a big spring that has the best ice-cold water."

Paul was President of our club in 2009. He was Vice-President for two years before that. He was Issues Committee Chairman and on the Board of Directors in 2005 and 2006.

Mark Wright is our 2010 Vice-President and

was Vice-President in 2009 as well. Before that he was on the Board of Directors. Mark has a degree in Psychology and a second degree in Emotionally Disturbed Youth, a field he worked in for 25 years. For 8 years he



has been teaching Psychology at Big Sky High School. He also coached girls volleyball for 16 years. Mark is a smokejumper in the summertime; he is certified as an EMT with the Smokejumper Assn. In addition to being Vice-President for BCH of Missoula, he teaches CPR and saw training and he and his wife, Jenna, work on every committee for major club events.



Jenna Wright is the 2010 Secretary, as she was in 2009. Jenna grew up in Corvallis, MT. Her first horse was a palomino named Sundance. She has a degree in Health and Physical Education and a second degree in Curriculum and Instruction. She was a personal trainer at The Women's Club Health and Fitness Center for ten years until Mark convinced her to get her teaching certificate. She now teaches Women's Health and Performance at the Frenchtown High School. Jenna served as the club's Social Chairperson, a huge job, before taking the job of Secretary in 2009.

Connie Long is our 2010 Treasurer. In her own words...........'I am currently Treasurer and Senior State Director. I was President of



the club in 2007 and 2008. I have been a member of the club for 15 years. I also represent the club on the Missoula Horsemen's Council, a group that oversees the Missoula Equestrian

Park.

I am a Registered Nurse at Community Medical Center in an "on-call" position. This means that I fill in for other nurses who are taking vacations. Mack & I have three grown children, and two grandsons ages one and three.

I have been a hunting and fishing guide in the Bob Marshall Wilderness in the past and plan to be a fishing guide in the Bob this summer. I am a strong advocate for wilderness—there is no place I'd rather be."

Board and State Directors

Ken Brown is on our Board of Directors this year, the second year of his two-year term. Ken was active in the

1980's and was President in 1989. As with all of us, when his children were in sports and school activities, he didn't have time to be very active in BCH of Missoula. He returned to be a very active member, serving on the Board and



helping with work projects in the back country. You'll also see him participating in many day rides and on committees for our major social events. Ken is the Director of Specialized Services for Opportunity Resources, Inc.

Ken Bransby was

elected to a two-year term on the Board of Directors. He has been a wrangler and a packer, owned a painting business, and has recently formed Bransby Law Firm



in Stevensville. Ken says he joined Back Country Horsemen of Missoula because he thought they'd be a good group to belong to.

Smoke Elser is a founding member of BCH of Missoula which he helped organize in 1973. He was the interim president for March, April and May of 1973 until new officers were elected and Raynor Roberts took over as President. Smoke was club President two other terms, and Vice-President in 2002. He has been elected to the Board of Directors and the State Board many times over the years as well, serving as Education Chairman and Forest Service Liaison.

Many probably don't realize that Smoke was instrumental in getting the Missoula Equestrian Park set aside. He was part of the Equestrian Program at the University of Montana from 1957 to 1964 when the University supported an indoor riding arena, 40 boxed stalls, and leased out horses and classrooms. Missoula was known for the largest Northwest Horse Show in the country at that time. Smoke envisioned getting this 90-acre parcel set aside and building an indoor arena to promote the Northwest Horse Show.

Smoke and his wife, Thelma, celebrated 50

years in the Bob Marshall in 2007. They felt fortunate to have lived out their dream of living in the mountains with their outfitting business. They were running 16 to 18



summer pack trips, averaging eight days each and 4 to 6 8-day hunts each year. Smoke is a legend in the outfitting business. He once said he loved it for many reasons, but mostly to see what there might be over the mountain or around the bend in the trail.

Smoke is called a "wilderness hero" for the work he's done to protect Montana's Wilderness Areas. He has been involved in every effort to protect wilderness since before the Wilderness Act passed in 1964. He worked to protect the Lincoln-Scapegoat Wilderness designated in 1972. He's been on the political front for the Blackfoot Clearwater Stewardship Project and more recently the Forest Jobs and Recreation Bill.

Smoke teaches a Wilderness Outfitting and Packing Course at the University of Montana and also Outfitting and Packing at Ninemile Wildlands Training Center. Smoke loves ice cream...... Barbara Koepke was BCH of Missoula's Treasurer from 2006 through 2009. She has been the chairperson of National Trails Day for the sixth year. She loves horseback riding-day rides and moonlight rides. Her current horse project is a gorgeous Palomino mare named Dancer. She is looking forward to riding in the back country

again.

Barb was a 4-H leader for six years in Las Vegas for dog care and training projects and veterinarian science. She loves to cook, especially



Dutch Oven cooking. She's famous for her huckleberry peach pie. The recipe is in a Cookbook for Breast Survivors that Barbara contributed to. Barb has many hobbies, too many she says, but sewing is at the top of her list (after horses) and she is currently working on appliquéd quilted centerpieces. If you have ever noticed her perfect handwriting you might know that she was a draftsman along with being a mom (to Michele and Diane) in earlier years. Barb drafted over 35 house plans in her working years.

Mack Long was elected to the Back Country Horsemen of Missoula Board of Directors in 2009 for a two-year term, which he is finishing in 2010.

Mack is currently Regional Supervisor for Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks. You have noticed his name in the media on issues involving fish and wildlife in this area, including the Fish Creek Fee Title acquisition which encompasses 41,000 acres of land west of



Missoula. Mack has been very active in protecting many landscapes and natural resources in Montana through other land purchases for public use as well. He has also been a strong supporter of Wilderness and back country protection as well as training and educating the our area. He is known for his success with public on wilderness skills.

Mack and Connie are always ready to help out with their mule string if folks need to be packed into the back country, such as volunteers for the Bob Marshall Foundation, National Smokejumpers Association trail crews and others.

Mack has three children and two grandsons. He says his favorite trail is whichever one is under his horse at the time.

Alan Meyers was voted to a two-year term on the Board of Directors in 2009. In addition to being on the BOD for the club, he is on the planning committee for the Membership Roundup, Christmas party and Father's Day Steak Ride. And when the committee gives him a job, you'd best stand back and watch! He is also a co-chairman of the Sponsorship Committee.

Alan was raised in St. Ignacius, Montana on a ranch. He loves packing into the back country. He says there's nothing better than watching a young horse get better and better on those

trips. And, he loves getting to see new country.

Alan owns Sky-Hi Auction Company which provides farm, ranch, land, livestock dispersal and liquidation. He is an auctioneer and ap-

praiser. Alan is a licensed realtor for commercial, land, ranch and residential properties. Previously, he was an owner of Missoula Livestock Auction and was a livestock auctioneer for 31 years. He still sells horses; always has a good, well-broke saddle horse for sale. Alan's wife, Kathy, teaches fifth grade at Hellgate Elementary. They have two grown sons who are both Missoula City firemen.

Gary Salisbury was voted to an Alternate State Director to represent our club. In 2009 he was also a State Director. In 2008, he was on the Board as Past President. In 2004, then President Bob Doty became ill and couldn't complete his term, so Gary offered to take over for him. Gary was also elected President the following year-2005. He has been the Chairman of the Steak Ride Committee for several years.

Gary started breaking horses when he was 15 years old, then started observing their behavior. What he learned through the years about horse behavior has made him

one of the most successful horse trainers in problem horses. Gary also owns Salisbury Auction Service.

Don't miss Gary & Caroline's April 3rd Spring Tune-up for Horses and Humans. You'll get to see first-hand Gary's gift of working with horses. Caroline is organizing a Dutch oven potluck that day. Richard Tamcke was elected to the club's Board of Directors for a two-year term. He was a Board member last year as well. He is



HORSE TRAILS AND HORSE NUMBERS

Referenced from one of our library books: "Recreational Horse Trials in Rural and Wildland Areas" by Gene W. Wood, et al.

Ranking of total Federal and State lands listed by contiguous states: Idaho has the most with 16,327 miles. California ranks the second with 12,961 miles. Montana has the third most Federal and State lands with 12,991 miles. Colorado is fourth with 11,555 miles and Wyoming is fifth with 9,133 miles.

Texas ranks highest of percentage of numbers of horses with 10.6%. Colorado has 7.6%, Florida has 5.4 %, Oklahoma has 3.6% and Kentucky has 3.5%.

Wyoming has the highest ownership of horse per capita, followed by South Dakota, then Montana, Idaho and lastly North Dakota.



Book Review

Great news! Our club's library has two new addi-

tions. One is an audio set of two CD's called "Why Does My Horse Do That?" by Clinton Anderson. His message is that if you are tired of your horse behaving badly, do something about it. Teach him to stop biting, fidgeting, walking off when mounting, pulling back when tied,



jigging on the trail, resisting clippers and more. The CD's address how horses think, behave, and react.



The second addition is 2-1/2 hour instructional video called "Packing Horses & Mules for the Back Country" by Brandon Carpenter. Brandon was a game warden for MT FW&P and he gives clinics frequently in this area. He addresses rope needs and

knots, saddle types and fit, saddle tree fitting, packing boxes and panniers, manties, hitches, packing game and antlers and more.

In Memory of Joyce RuanaBy the Editor

Joyce Ruana passed away the day after Christmas. Her husband, Denny, died on February 19, 2009. Joyce cared for him during the last months of his declining health. She and Denny raised one daughter, three sons, as well as foster children.

She's left us with "a hole in our hearts." Her absence will be noticed especially when riding season starts. Riding season started every year with a call from Joyce reporting that her horse was shod. If Denny didn't have time to put the shoes on, she'd hire a farrier.

Joyce made horse backing a priority. She would let her housework and gardening go during riding season, because trail riding for Joyce was her priority and she thought it should be everyone else's priority too! Joyce kept a calendar each year of her trail rides. When you saw her on the trail she knew exactly how many she'd been on that season. And at the end of the season she was trying to pack a few more in for her calendar.

Joyce often talked about growing up in Target Range area since her par-

ents, Ken & Lena Richardson, owned acreage there. She told us that many days as a youngster she'd be out all day exploring on horseback. She could ride to the fairgrounds and race around the track, then up to Farviews and over to Blue Mountain. When her own children were small, Denny would come home from work at lunchtime and tell her to take a break from the house and go ride. She would take Chiquita and ride from their place on the Clark Fork River across to Kelly Island a lot.

Many wouldn't know she was an unofficial membership chairperson for our club. She'd tell her horsey friends they needed to go to the membership drives and support BCH of Missoula. "They clean our trails for us. We need to support them," she say.

Joyce will be missed terribly. We take

comfort that we knew her and that we can carry on what she taught us. Now we will be the mentors. It'll be us who pick the rider up out of the dirt, dust them off and tell them to get back in the saddle. It will be up to us to call out the names of the wildflowers. Now it's up to us to help

someone out with a new horse. And who's going to step up in her place to be the first one mounted? I guess we'll even have to make our own lemonade when life gives us lemons.


